

## Partners in Education Vistawall

The Center for Technology and Vistawall Group are Partners in Education. Vistawall is an industry in Greene County that manufactures and distributes entrances, storefronts, framing systems, and curtain wall systems. As we prepare students to enter manufacturing careers. we want our students to know what kinds of high school and higher education classes are recommended by Vistawall for their employees. Their recommendations for those wishing to work in the business part of their company include: speech and communication skills, algebra, geometry, keyboarding skills, and business writing. For those wanting to work in the manufacturing area, skills

needed might include: electricity, CNC machining, PLC machining, electronics, hydraulics/pneumatics, welding, carpentry, blueprint reading, AUTOCAD, industrial math, and measuring and gauging. Other recommended skills include chemistry, accounting, office practices and procedures, and basic computing and use of software skills. Classes offered at the Center for Technology that would meet these recommendations include Principles of Machining, Welding, Carpentry, Computer Aided Drafting, and PC Repair and Networking.

### Hamblen County Visitors

On October 19, visitors from Hamblen County toured the Center for Technology. Included in the group were members of the Hamblen County Board of Education, the Director of Schools, administrators from the two high schools, and county commissioners. They are looking at ways to handle their growing numbers of students, as well as the growing expectations of the area business community.

Principal, Jerry Renner, outlined both advantages and disadvantages of being a

separate center that serves five different high schools. Some of the advantages include being able to purchase more and better equipment and having a larger pool of students to draw from when deciding on classes. Another advantage is working closely with business and industry. Most of the disadvantages spring from the center being a joint operation between two school systems and the distances some of the students have to be bused.

The visitors were impressed with the visit. They are continuing their efforts to

determine the best route for their school system to take between building a new shared facility like the Center for Technology or renovation to both East and West High Schools. One advantage the Hamblen County schools already have is access to the Tennessee Technology Center where some of their high school students already take classes as a part of their high school curriculum.
